From the Dean's Desk

THE GOD OF FREEDOM HEARS THE CRIES OF THE OPPRESSED

It is said "every prophet is a critic, but not every critic is a prophet."

The Old Testament Reading for Proper 26, Lectionary A, reveals the prophet Micah to be a critic. And who is not afraid to condemn the entire nation of Israel, and to specify certain groups. Biblical and social history reveal that "it is always those classes or individuals in the country who wield power, social, military or religious-kings, priests, judges and rich." These are the people to whom Micah targets his attacks- "Hear this, you rulers of the house of Jacob and chiefs of the house of Israel who abhor justice and pervert all equity, who build Zion with blood and Jerusalem with wrong! It's rulers give judgement for a bribe, its priests teach for a price, its prophets gives oracles for money....." (**Micah 3:9-11**)

Amos says- "Ah you that turn justice to wormwood and bring righteousness to the ground..... Therefore, you trample on the poor and take from them lives of grain, you have built houses of hewn stone, but you shall not live in them; you have planted pleasant vineyards, but you shall not drink their wine.....and you who push aside the needy in the gatelet justice roll down like waters, and righteousness like an ever flowing stream." (**Amos 5:7,11,12,6,4**)

It is said that "when power is centralized, oppressive power- structures emerge. In a monarchical system such centralized power becomes a yoke." Perhaps, there are those who would remember my several articles written in the bulletins- **From the Dean's Desk** entitled- "History, the Rudder of Our Nation." And recently, I sought to show why we should study our history (Caribbean). Because we need to retrace the struggles of our forbearers, to become the prophetic voice and rediscover new ways or paradigm shifts that we can build on the foundation of nation builders.

We cannot get away from the fact that historical study as a “rigorous, critical discipline, exercised on behalf of humanity, its dignity and freedom” is essential to our well-being and indeed our survival. For our history reveals that there was a time in the history of the Caribbean peoples that the “masses felt helpless in the stranglehold of oppressive centralized power.”

We must not forget that we have evolved out of a system so structured as to maintain the status of the powerful, middle class and an Eurocentric and colonized people. However, thanks to the pioneering work of Eric Williams “Capitalism and Slavery”, “From Columbus to Castro”: and C.L.R James with “Black Jacobins”, we were able to begin the process to correct the imbalance, prejudice and incorrect socio-cultural, historical perspectives of the Eurocentric historians that played havoc, and continue, in some measure, to do so on the minds of our people.

This is a very serious historical time. And as a young nation we need to fashion and re-fashion our systems, structures and policies for inclusiveness and equilibrium of views. For, it is a fact that colonialism has left an indelible mark on the mind of many. Therefore, the process of development will involve deconstruction and decolonization of the minds- “to emancipate our minds from mental slavery.”

Let our bear in mind that one of the things that the patriarchal and imperialistic world conveniently did, was to separate the sacred from the secular. They sought to take away the spirit of African religion that holds a very clear belief in the Supremacy of God. And by doing so produced a state of horrors, fragmentation, injustice, untruth, cruelty, violence and genocide. We have not been able to get out of such mind set.

But we know that the power that helped to sustain our African forebears on the “Calvary” of the Atlantic and the “Floating” tomb of the “Middle Passage” is still with us. And so, we must allow this spirituality “to thrust us forward towards the continuous revelation of the mysteries of God in our lives. Never allow the negative, neocolonial minds to take us off the ‘track’ nor allow the economic domination from outside the region to create a state of helplessness and hopelessness. We must also carry the spirit of tenacity and resiliency. We cannot lay back and play ignorant to our colonial history and so fail to engage in the process of the decolonization of the mind, to shake-off the shackles, and to engage in the continuous cry for freedom and justice, peace and love, unity and reconciliation. We must learn the truth that life has a high dimension and a much more serious objectivity. We must not involve in the silly games that some people play and the all-day entertainment. Never allow the negativism to destroy the potential and possibilities for positive movement and development for the future. Listen to the important cry for liberation.

The Education Revolution offers the moment for a higher level and movement for all of us. But we have to be active at all levels of the resistance that the colonialists and their cronies may offer. Resist the negative literatures that are published, censor the programmes from our television channels, denounce acts of violence, those who are involved in illicit drugs, immoral behaviour, the rapist, child molesters, all those who speak words of hatred, disunity, fragmentation, separation, irreconciliation and all those who seek to mitigate the forward movement of the Nation.

Our dignity, value and worth must not be left to the erosive elements of the oppressors and suppressors, discriminators and the bias interpreters of the signs of time, but to use a historical hermeneutics to say I believe in the God of the oppressed and to work at all time within the economy and justice of the God of the poor and working class peoples of His world.

Let us take the words of Kenneth ‘Scakes’ Alleyne seriously and to concretize it in our everyday living. He sang it in that moment of history when our nation was born.

This is the time for us:

“To join hand in hand now
Put your differences aside
Get your hearts and souls together
We got to build this nation with pride
Work in harmony with good leaders
Never elect no one here to rule.
Then we can feel at home like good comrades
Our people must not be election tool.”
